Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) Use of Native Wildflowers along State Roads By William Moriaty

Nothing interrupts the monotony of highway driving more than a splashy display of wildflowers in the median or along the roadside. For just a moment one forgets the madness of fellow drivers and enjoys the beauty of the colorful vegetation.

One person who has had a terrific influence on the beautification of our state roads is William Moriaty, District Maintenance Roadside Vegetation Coordinator for Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) in Tampa. For 12 years, he has been responsible for the District's wildflower program, exotic nuisance plant control initiatives, vegetation management planning and contracting, and vegetation management at outdoor advertising. He also administered the Department's Highway Beautification Grant program at the District level for eight years.

William founded the non-profit volunteer tree planting organization, Tampa Bay Reforestation and Environmental Effort, Inc (TREE), in 1983 and still serves as its current president. He is also a founding member of the Suncoast Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society. In addition, he has authored three copyrighted publications including "Plants of the William Bartram Florida Native Plant Gardens," and written his first book entitled "William Moriaty's Florida."





#### PLANT PROFILE

• Common name: Eastern redbud

• **Botanical name:** Cercis canadensis L.

Synonyms: NoneFamily: Fabaceae (Pea)

• **Zone:** 4 - 9

• Plant Habit: Medium, deciduous tree

• **Habitat:** Mesic hammocks

• **Size:** 15 to 30 ft (h) x 10 to 35 ft (w)

• Leaves: Alternate, simple, heart-shaped, dull green, 3-6 inches

• **Bloom:** Small, irregular, pea-like bright pink to magenta flowers in long on old wood

• Flowering time: February to March; before leaves appear

• Fruit: Flattened, light brown, 4-inch long pod in fall

• Bark: Mostly smooth, gray

• **Distribution:** North and central Florida

• Growing conditions: Well-drained soils

• Water: Dry to moist; very drought tolerant, tolerates occasional flooding

• **Light**: Full sun to shade

• **Propagation:** Seed

• Motility: Low; seeds may germinate near parent

• Maintenance: Occasional trimming of leggy branches and seed pods

• Availability: Usually at Florida native nurseries and native plant sales; occasionally at big box stores

• **Comments:** Early spring blooms `

• Landscape uses: Specimen tree in natural setting



# **Glossary**

Need help identifying native plants? Here are a few more definitions to help you from the <u>Guide to the Vascular Plants of Florida</u> by Richard P. Wunderlin

#### S

**Scabrous.** Rough to the touch.

Scandent. Climbing.

**Seed.** A mature ovule.

**Sepal.** One division of the calyx.

Septum. A partition.

**Serrate.** Toothed along the margin with sharp, forward-pointing teeth.

**Sessile.** Attached directly by the base, without a stalk.

**Sinuate.** With a strongly wavy margin.

**Spadix.** A spike with small, partially embedded flowers on a thickened fleshly axis in the Araceae, this usually subtended by a spathe.

**Spathe.** A usually large and solitary bract, surrounding an inflorescence.

**Spike.** An unbranched, elongate, inflorescence with sessile or subsessile flowers.

**Sporangium.** A body bearing spores.

**Spore.** In pteridophyters (ferns), the one cell reproductive structure.

**Stamen.** The male organ of the flower.

**Stellate.** Star-shaped; trichomes with branches radiating from the base.

**Stigma.** The upper part of the carpel or style with is receptive to pollen.

Stipe. A stalk.

**Stipel.** One of a pair of small stipulelike appendages on the leaflets of compound leaves.

**Stipule.** One of a pair of appendages found at the base of a petiole on many leaves.

**Stolon.** An elongate stem creeping on the surface of the ground.

**Striate.** Marked with fine, more or less parallel lines or ridges.

**Style.** The more or less elongated part of the carpel between the ovary and the stigma.

**Subulate.** Elongate and tapering gradually from the base to apex; awl-shaped.


