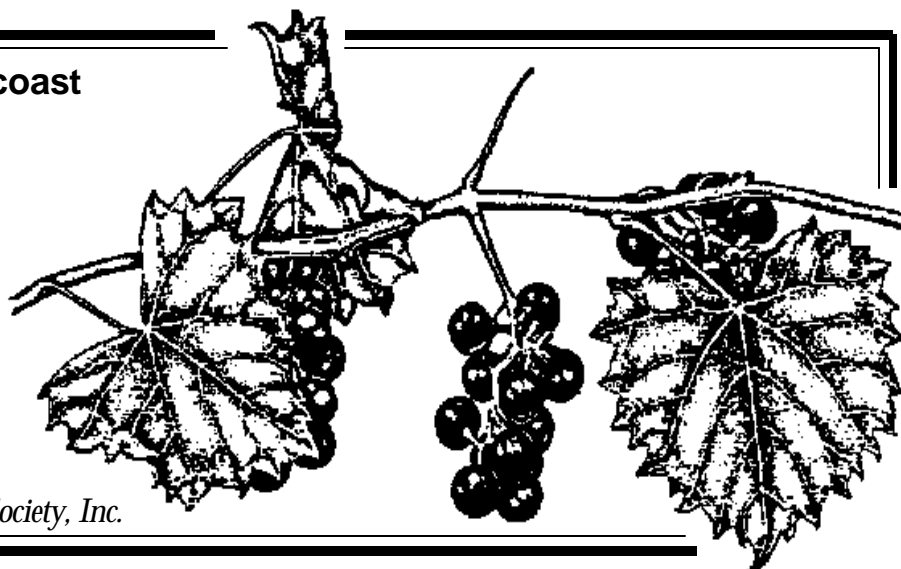

MAKING WET SPOTS LOOK GOOD

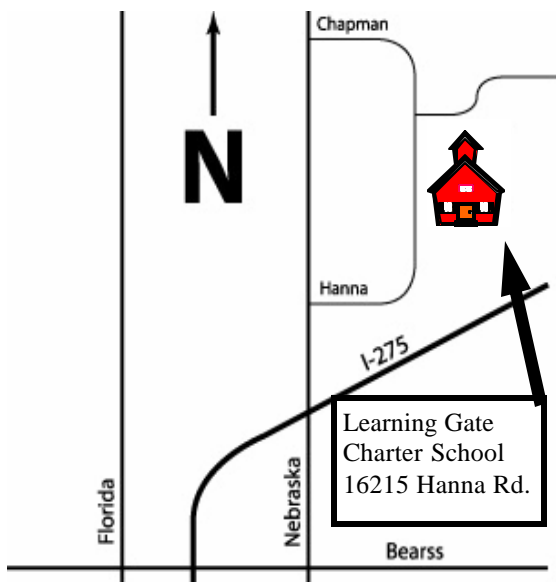
To attract wildlife to our backyards, we need to provide three essentials: food, cover, and water. The plants we choose can supply the first two essentials. The third can be as simple as a strategically placed birdbath, or it can be as complicated as a backyard pond. Craig Watson's program will give us some ideas as to how, why, and where to build and aquascape a pond, as well as some first-hand accounts of what not to do. Craig is well-known not only for his expertise in aquaculture, but also for the humor he brings to his presentations, so come prepared to laugh as well as learn. He claims that he was touted as an "expert" in ponds and native aquatic plants when word got out that he had built a small garden pond on his property in Valrico.

Craig has been a member of the Florida Native Plant Society since 1989, and was a past vice president of our own Suncoast chapter. Currently, he is the director of the University of Florida's Tropical Aquaculture Laboratory in Ruskin, which conducts research and extension education programs for the state's ornamental aquaculture industry. He has been with the University of Florida since 1988.

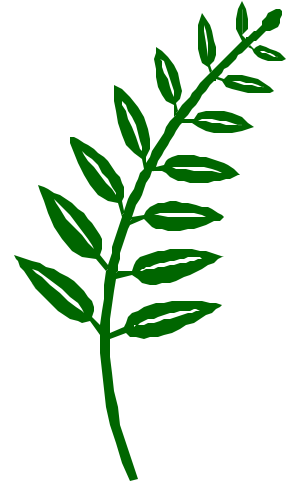


Message from the President

BOK SANCTUARY
Now through Sep 30 Plein Air Painters of Central Florida is a group of artists who paint landscapes much like the artist colonies of the past, "en plein air," which means in the open air. The painting styles of the ten artists represented range from realism to expressionism with mediums of oil, watercolor and acrylics. Pieces painted at Historic Bok Sanctuary depicting the beauty and uniqueness of the National Historic Landmark founded in 1929 also are exhibited. Through their art, the Plein Air Painters of Central Florida record a rapidly vanishing time and place as Central Florida is increasingly developed. Although the artists paint at the same sites together, their portrayal of those sites in their work is vastly different. The sensory experiences of painting on-site and watching the light change as it moves across the land is a constant source of inspiration and challenge for the painters.

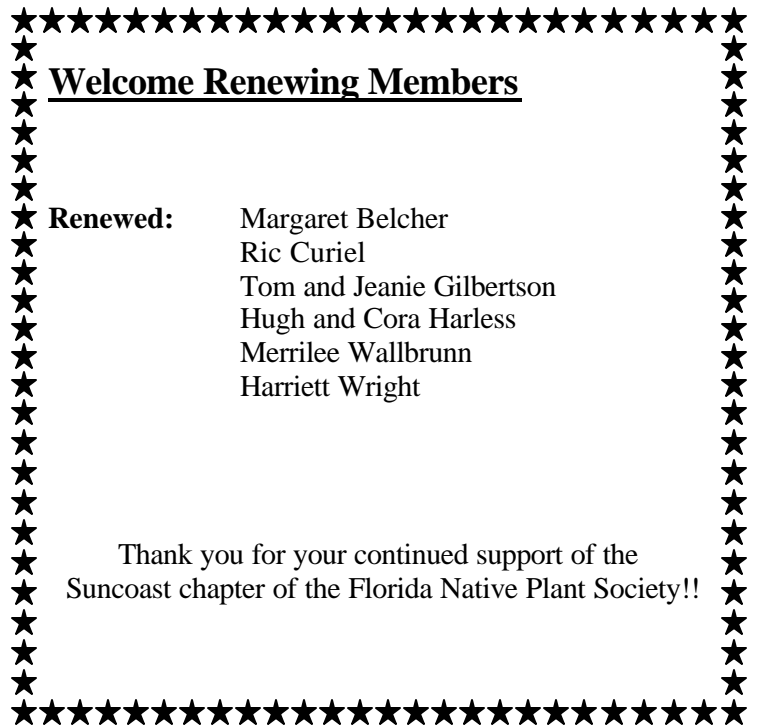

PLANT PROFILE

Common name: Standing Cypress; Spanish Larkspur; syn. *Gilia rubra* (L.) A. Heller, Skyrocket.

Botanical name: *Ipomopsis rubra* (Linnaeus) Wherry

Family: Polemoniaceae (Phlox Family)

Plant habit: A biennial herb – some forms are annuals

Size: 2-5 ft. tall

Leaves: Alternate, sessile, crowded on the stem, and having finely-cut segments.

Inflorescence: A terminal panicle

Flowers: Showy, scarlet to red-orange, 1" or more long, 5-parted, funnel-shaped, with 5 stamens.

Fruit: A capsule

Flowering time: Summer (Annual forms bloom in spring)

Habitat: Sandhills, dunes, coastal strand, dry pinelands and ruderal sites

Distribution: In Florida, central and northern peninsula, west to E. panhandle, Escambia Co., W to Texas and N to North Carolina

Light: Full sun

Soil: Sandy and well-drained

Water: Only until established

Propagation: By seed

Maintenance: Remove spent plants.

Availability: Several native plant nurseries

Wildlife value: Butterfly nectar plant.

Comments: Miles of scattered stands of *Ipomopsis rubra* can be seen at Canaveral National Seashore along the road behind the dunes.
