What's Next at the USF Botanical Gardens?

Speaker: Craig Huegel, PhD April 23, 2023, 2 pm

In Person at MOSI

Craig will be talking to us about the USF Botanical Gardens and his plans for them under his leadership.

Craig has a long history as an advocate, educator, scientist and author working to advance the conservation and appreciation of native plants has distinguished him as a mentor to the FNPS membership. In 1987, he cofounded the Cooperative Urban Wildlife Program while serving as a member of the faculty at the University of Florida. It was a program that helped reveal the direct connection between native plants and wildlife occurrence, and the concept of "landscaping for wildlife", to a much larger audience. Our understanding of that connection, which seemed academic and somewhat radical 37 years ago, is easily taken for granted now. He also established the Florida Backyard Wildlife Habitat Program and Pinellas County's Environmental Lands Division, where he served as Administrator for 12 years. He also was a founding member of the Pinellas County Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society. In 2020, he was honored with and FNPS Mentor Award, and award given to people who have demonstrated a lifetime history of supporting FNPS and its programs.

We need a good volunteer crew to make this easy and fun! Opportunities on Friday, Saturday, and Suncay. Saturday morning will be busy!


The sale starts at 10:00am, 9:30am for garden members. It ends at 3:00 each day. \$5 admission is waived for volunteers.

Earth Day Ideas Some ideas for celebrating Earth Day with native plants

Every year on April 22, Earth Day marks the anniversary of the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970.

Senator Gaylord Nelson, the junior Democratic senator from Wisconsin, championed Earth Day as a teaching event and as a public support for improving environmental conditions in the U.S. One of the specific concerns in 1970 was a massive oil spill in California in 1969. Nelson enlisted a conservation-minded Republican to join him, Pete McCloskey. The idea included teach-ins and sit-ins on college campuses to attract the media. The events focused on college campuses. The specific day was chosesn to hold the event on a spring weekday to encourage student participation

That first Earth Day did just that, apparently inspiring 10% of the US population to demonstrate against continued pollution.

The popularity of the first Earth Day contributed to creation of the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the passage of other seminal environmental laws, including the National Environmental Education Act (NEPA), the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA), the Clean Air Act Clean Water Act, the Endangered Species Act and the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act. We can credit these federal laws with tangible improvements in air quality (less smog), stream water quality (burning rivers are much rarer today), and we have at least some protections against environmental dangers and workplace hazards.

- 1. Take your favorite young people for a walk in one of our local nature preserves.
- 2. Do you have a friend who can no longer drive? Invite them on a stroll or bench sit in an easy-to-access natural area such as Lettuce Lake Park.
