When so many plants include the term weed in their names, how do we know whether we should welcome that plant into our yards or if we should dump the plant in the yard trash can? To confuse us even more, lawn maintenance or pesticide companies insist they know the answer, and for a fee they will be pleased to take care of a problem we didn't even know we had.

Instead of relying on a profit-driven sales representative or anyone else to tell us the answer, this presentation will suggest 4 questions we can ask to help us make this decision ourselves based on what we value and then ask these questions about several common plants that we might find in our Florida yards.

Susan was born in Tampa and has lived there almost all her life. In fact she lives next door to the house she grew up in and her son lives in her childhood home. After graduating from USF, she taught high school English for 38 years, almost all at Pinellas Park High School. When she retired in 2011, she happily filled her time with travel and gardening instead of teaching literature and essay writing.

She joined the Florida Native Plant Society in 2016 and the newly formed Florida Native Gardening FB Group in 2019, eventually joining the group's admin team. She remains committed to native gardening and her goal of building a safe habitat for urban wildlife, her 2 pups and herself on Tampa's Interbay Peninsula.

There will be light refreshments and a plant auction at the meeting. If you have plants to exchange or a snack to share, please bring them along.


# June Field Trip

# Double Branch Bay Preserve hike with SNPS



Today's adventure was at the Double Branch Bay Nature Preserve, a Hillsborough County ELAPP site south of West Hillsborough Avenue.

Ten plant lovers and two bird seed lovers met and received general route info from trip leader Steve Dickman with warnings about the dangerous crossing of busy Hillsborough Avenue, all 64 lanes, so it seemed. But we did it safely, and in fine style, with no bumps, bruises, feather ruffling, or bone crunching. A Hard Morning's Night it wasn't. Secure on the other side, we walked west along Hillsborough Avenue 3/10 of a stressful mile to the small parking area and preserve entrance.

The footage supports the design and placement of crossings on major roadways, which would otherwise be significant barriers.

# Extension Services Uses Suncoast Grant to Enhance Garden and Front Entrance

The UF/IFAS Extension Service received a \$500 grant to buy plants for the garden and front entrance and to give native milkweeds to participants in the native gardening workshop.

The UF/IFAS Extension Discovery Garden serves as a living classroom and is open to the public during office hours. This spring, the front entrance and butterfly garden at UF/IFAS Extension Hillsborough County got a makeover. Native milkweeds including Swamp milkweed (*Asclepias incarnata*) and white milkweed (*Asclepias perennis*) were added to the butterfly garden in the back of the building along with yellowtop (*Flaveria linearis*), stokes aster (*Stokesia laevis*), and twinflower (*Dyschoriste oblongifolia*). The front entrance got enhanced by some yellow and purple flowering natives including lanceleaf coreopsis (*Coreopsis lanceolata*), narrowleaf silkgrass (*Pityopsis graminifolia*), beach verbena (*Glandularia maritima*), pineland lantana (*Lantana depressa* var. *depressa*), scrub mint (*Conradina canascens*) and Georgia calamint (*Calamintha georgiana*). These new plantings will help to educate the public about the use of natives in landscaping and native milkweeds in butterfly gardens. The gardens are maintained by the Master Gardener Volunteers.
